In the third century there were three martyred priests with the name Valentine. One of them would marry young Roman soldiers that were forbidden to wed by emperor Claudius. He was imprisoned for this and when he healed a blind girl he was released and started to evangelize this pagan household. For this he was imprisoned again and in prison he exchanged letters with the young woman he had healed. His last letter to her before he was killed was signed: "From your Valentine." Thus began the tradition. St. Valentine please pray for an outpouring of love between all peoples.

I found a quote from Archbishop Fulton Sheen: "A divine trick has been played on the human heart as if a violin teacher gave his pupil an instrument with one string missing.
